One is Not the Loneliest Number

In 1969, the American rock band Three Dog Night lyrically informed its fans and all who would go on to hear their song *One* that "One is the loneliest number that you'll ever do."

This belief that one is the loneliest position to inhabit and to be strongly avoided remains a commonly held feeling in the human psyche of the 21st Century. Our society is deeply entrenched in a culture of numbers, isn't it? We measure our worth by the number of "likes" our posts receive, the hits our websites get, or the followers we have. The more, the better, no matter the source. A single digit would be a colossal failure, shattering our egos. Quantity, it seems, is the ultimate affirmation of our place in the universe and our worth compared to others.

When we think of our faith, I imagine one of the images that comes to mind for some is a sanctuary on a Sunday morning packed with folks gathered to praise God, sing hymns, and be fed by the Good News and God's gift of Holy Communion. The more the better. Yet, Christianity, despite what we might visualize, is not a religion for the masses and neither was Jesus' message. Granted, Jesus does speak to large crowds and feeds many in one sitting, but Jesus' most powerful, permanently life-altering engagements occur when he is one-on-one with God's children and displaying his concern for the well-being of the individual: the woman ostracized by others at the well who receives forgiveness and "living water", the one leper who is moved to return to thank Jesus for the life-changing gift of healing, and the one sheep searched for while the other ninety-nine are left behind.

Each of us is the focus of God's love through Jesus Christ. He died for us individually, was resurrected so we could each have eternal life, and claims and transforms us through our baptism. The power of the Gospel is not focused on the many, but on the one—you, me, our neighbor. God values us individually, without comparing us to others or assigning worth beyond the love he has for us—one sheep at a time. Claimed by God's singular love,

Help Wanted: Bergstrasse Community Clothing Closet

Bergstrasse Community Clothing Closet is open the first weekend of every month for persons in need of clothing and other household goods. Entrance is accessible via the door off the lower parking lot. Hours are Saturday noon – 2pm and Sunday 11am – 1pm. Next open August 17th and 18th for a special back to school clothing giveaway.

Donations: Currently there is a desperate need for men's pants, shorts and shoes. There is always a need for children's clothing. All clothing in good shape is accepted as are household items like sheets, towels, etc. Donations may be dropped off at Bergstrasse when the Community Clothing Closet is open. There is a special need for donation of a bookcase for use by the Clothing Closet.

Volunteers: sort clothing, hang it and tag it by color to keep track of what is moving and what is not, and greet shoppers at the courtesy desk. Shoppers check in and specify how many people they are shopping for and what items are of particular interest. Volunteers meet at 6-7:30pm on the Friday before the

Closet is open to sort donations and get them ready for the next day. On Saturdays and Sundays when the Closet is open, volunteers are needed from 11:30 - 2:30 and 10:30 - 1:30. You do not need to be there the entire time to volunteer – whatever time you have available within those times is fine. If you have further questions, you may either stop by the next time the Closet is open and have a look around or call Pattie Martin at 717-344-1347.
